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To put it bluntly, you are dressing up as Christ. If you like, you are pretending. Because, of course, the moment you realise what the words mean, you realise that you are not a son of God. You are not a being like The Son of God, whose will and interests are at one with those of the Father: you are a bundle of self-centred fears, hopes, greeds, jealousies, and self-conceit, all doomed to death. So that, in a way, this dressing up as Christ is a piece of outrageous cheek. But the odd thing is that He has ordered us to do it.





"OUR FATHER ... "

Our Father who art in heaven.

What does this mean? With these words God tenderly invites us to believe that He is our true Father and that we are His true children, so that with all boldness and confidence we may ask Him as dear children ask their dear father.

"Do you now see that those words mean? They mean quite frankly, that you are putting yourself in the place of a son of God." (pp. 187-188)

- Two kinds of pretense:

 1. Pretense is there instead of the real thing.

 2. Pretense leads up to the real thing.

"Very often the only way to get a quality in reality is to start behaving as if you had it already." (p. 188) $\,$

The real Son of God is at your side. He is beginning to turn you into the same kind of thing as Himself. He is beginning, so to speak, to 'inject' His kind of life and thought, His Zoe, into you; beginning to turn the tin soldier into a live man. The part of you that does not like it is the part that is still tin.

And now we begin to see what it is that the New Testament is always talking about. It talks about Christians 'being born again'; it talks about them 'putting on Christ'; about Christ 'being formed in us'; about our coming to 'have the mind of Christ'.

Romans 8:29 because those God foreknew, he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, so that he would be the firstborn among many brothers.

Philippians 3:10-11 I do this so that I may know him and the power of his resurrection and the fellowship of his sufferings, being conformed to his death, in the hope that in some way I may arrive at the resurrection from the dead.

Sanctification: A change in the sinner.

- · Based on Justification.
- Wide Sense: Everything the Holy Spirit does to bring us to faith in Jesus and keep us in the faith.
 Narrow Sense: The new life the believer lives through faith in Jesus Christ.

HOW DOES GOD "CONFORM" US TO HIMSELF?

Some of you may feel that this is very unlike your own experience. You may say 'I've never had the sense of being helped by an invisible Christ, but I often have been helped by other human beings.' That is rather like the woman in the first

"All our work in the field, in the garden, in the city, in the home, in struggle, in government – to what does it all amount before God except child's play, by means of which God is pleased to give his gifts in the field, at home, and everywhere? These are the masks of our Lord God, behind which he wants to be hidden and to do all things." (Luther)

HOW DOES GOD "CONFORM" US TO HIMSELF?

Men are mirrors, or 'carriers' of Christ to other men. Sometimes unconscious carriers. This 'good infection' can be carried by those who have not got it themselves. People who were not Christians themselves helped me to Christianity. But usually it is those who know Him that bring Him to others.

TWO OTHER DISCOVERIES

- 1. We start to see not just what we do, but who we are.
- "Surely that a man does when he is taken off his guard is the best evidence for what sort of man he is?" (p. 192)
- " The suddenness does not create the rats: it only prevents them from hiding." (p. 192)
- 2. God does everything for us, even though we describe what we are doing.
- "In a sense you might even say it is God who does the pretending." (p. 193)
- "After the first few steps in the Christian life we realise that everything which really needs to be done in our souls can be done only by God." (p. 193)

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MAKING OUR PAYMENT

In fact, we are very like an honest man paying his taxes. He pays them all right, but he does hope that there will be enough left over for him to live on. Because we are still taking our natural self as the starting point.

Moralism: "An attempt to produce good behavior by appealing to what is good for the person or for society."

Legalism: "An attempt to produce Christian living through the law." **Speculation**: "The assumption that knowledge is the key to spiritual fulfillment."

Mysticism: "Attaining the ecstatic experience of becoming one with God."

MAKING OUR PAYMENT

For, make no mistake: if you are really going to try to meet all the demands made on the natural self, it will not have enough left over to live on.

"The proclamation of the law alone, without Christ, either makes presumptuous people, who believe that they can fulfill the law with their outward works, or drives people into total despair." (Formula of Concord, Article V)

WHAT'S HARD AND EASY "If I am a field that contains "It may be hard for an egg to turn into a bird: it would be a jolly sight harder for it to learn nothing by grass-seed, I cannot produce wheat. Cutting the grass may keep it short: but I shall still John 13:8 Peter told him, "You will never, to fly while remaining an egg. We are like eggs at present. And produce grass and no wheat. WHAT'S HARD AND EASY

The Christian way is different: harder, and easier. Christ says 'Give me All. I don't want so much of your time and so much of your money and so much of your work: I want You. I have not come to torment your natural self, but to kill it. No half-measures are any good. I don't want to cut off a branch here and a branch there, I want to have the whole tree down.

1 Corinthians 15:53 For this perishable body must put on imperishability, and this mortal body must put on immortality.

WHAT'S HARD AND EASY

If we're struggling with what makes Christianity hard, what can we do?

- 1. Pray.
- 2. Make more (and better) use of God's Word and Sacrament.
- 3. Resist the temptation to make God's way different.
- 4. Recognize that change starts small and takes time.
- 5. Look for ways you might be getting in God's way.
- 6. Start trying.
